The Carl Brandon Society Awards

Arisia is proud to host the Carl Brandon Society's awards ceremony, happening this year on Sunday at 3:30 PM in Commonwealth Ballroom C. Who was Carl Brandon? What does the Carl Brandon Society do? What are these awards?

Carl Joshua Brandon was a fictional African American author in the San Francisco Bay area in the 1950s. He functioned as a pen name and alter ego for White writers participating in the Fantasy Amateur Press Association (FAPA). After another member of FAPA asked what the group would do if a "Negro" were to apply, Carl identified himself as Black, saying that he didn't mention it before because he didn't think it mattered. Carl's writing was mostly parodies of popular fiction and was well-known and loved in his community. He was drafted to be head editor of one of the fan organizations/fanzines in the area, and in 1958 he was in the lead to be elected as the new Official Editor of FAPA itself. Unfortunately, the hoax of his identity was accidentally revealed at the 1958 Worldcon when an author recognized someone else, one of Carl's creators, signing his name to a quote card.

The Carl Brandon Society is a nonprofit organization founded in 1999 to strengthen racial and ethnic diversity in the fields of speculative fiction. They took the name of Carl Brandon because, as their website says, "the existence of a lone, fictional Black writer underscores the fact that a fictional voice had to be invented for people of color, because we had none in fandom." The Society gives two awards: the Parallax Award to an author of color who has written an outstanding work of speculative fiction, and the Kindred Award to an author of any race or ethnicity who has written an outstanding work of speculative fiction dealing with issues of race and identity.

You Can Make Arisia More Accessible!

As a disability advocate, I am most often asked, "Is it okay to offer to help someone with a disability?" The answer is "Yes, but it often depends on how you do the asking." Here are three considerations to keep in mind (AID):

Ask before assuming. People with disabilities often develop ways of doing things which may look slow or inefficient to others, but which work best for them and, if they do wish for assistance, it may be for only a specific aspect of a task. For example, when being guided, blind people do not need to be led or supported, but only need to lightly touch a guide's elbow in order to follow that person. You might ask, "Would you like assistance?" and, if they say yes, then ask, "What would you like me to do?"

Identify yourself. As a blind person, I like to have a name to go with the voice, but this also works to identify context, as in "Hi, my name's Kestrell and I'm an Arisia volunteer. Can I help you?"

Don't grab, push, pull, yell, or otherwise invade a person's space. Aside from issues of respect, many people with disabilities may have mobility or pain issues which are aggravated by having people touching them. Also realize that a person's cane, wheelchair, or other such device functions as an extension of their body and the same "don't touch" rules apply to these devices. Lastly, **please** don't feel that you are the exception to the rule that it is rude to pet guide dogs that are in harness and working.
